The PMF Class of 2019's finalists represent 56 disciplines, 113 academic institutions, and 12% are veterans. As noted by Kelli Young, director of the John L. and Stephanie G. Palmer Career Center at the Maxwell School: "It is particularly gratifying to see so many current students among this year's finalists, as they can look forward to a placement with the federal government as soon as they receive their degree."
