RFG joined 20 good government organizations on Schedule F Coalition letter to the Hill

RFG joined more than 20 good government organizations and individuals who recently <u>sent</u> <u>a letter on this issue</u> to members of the U.S. Congress, urging them to block the detrimental executive order. A letter also was submitted to the incoming Biden Administration to make it a priority to rescind the order and prevent damage to the professional nonpartisan American civil service, an essential feature of our democracy.


